The Protestant Reformation



John Wycliffe - Morning Star of the Reformation

The year 2017 marked the 500th anniversary of Martin Luther's nailing of the *Ninety Five Theses* to the door of the Castle Church at Wittenberg, Germany. This event is often popularly believed to mark the beginning of the Protestant Reformation. In fact, significant attempts at reform began long beforehand and were separated afterward into various forms by Luther, John Calvin and others, developing into the Protestant churches as we know them today.

Little is known of the early life of John Wycliffe. (C. 1324-84) He was born at Hipswell, in the English county of Yorkshire. He studied at Oxford University, becoming master of Balliol College in 1361 and considered one of the great scholars of his day. In 1374, King Edward III named him to a commission to negotiate peace with France and to meet with papal representatives regarding English church appointments.

Eventually, Wycliffe began to promote reform. His writing *Of Civil Dominion* maintained that God is Lord over all things. Landholding clergymen were not owners, but stewards who, if they became corrupt, risked giving up their land to others, including secular landowners. Perhaps because of this, he found support and protection among the wealthy nobility, who often had little inward desire for spiritual things.

Wycliffe's writings also condemned unbiblical church teachings. The church, he said, was not composed of an outward organization, but individual elect believers. Christ alone headed the church, since a pope may not necessarily be among the elect. Wycliffe condemned the worship of saints and relics, indulgences and prayers for the dead.

Wycliffe will always be associated with the first complete translation of the English Bible. He collaborated with Nicholas of Hereford, who completed the Old Testament and part of the New Testament by 1384. Despite not knowing Hebrew or probably Greek, Wycliffe helped translate the English New Testament from the Latin Vulgate Bible. The entire work was revised by John Purvey in 1388.

While the later impact of the English Bible on language and society was tremendous, it was severely suppressed for over 150 years. The reading of it was outlawed in 1414. No authorized English Bible appeared until the English Reformation was well under way. Wycliffe's version did not appear in print until 1850.

Further controversies eventually lead to Wycliffe's expulsion from Oxford. In 1381, he attacked the doctrine of transubstantiation, which taught that the bread and wine in Communion, once consecrated by a priest, were transformed into Christ's actual body and blood to be sacrificed repeatedly. He saw this as not only unbiblical but exploitative. A peasant revolt, blamed on Wycliffe, but caused primarily by economic factors, gave fuel to his enemies. Driven from Oxford in 1382, Wycliffe retired to his rectory at Lutterworth in central England. Twice stricken with paralysis, he died on December 29, 1384.

Wycliffe's followers continued the cause. His zealous *Poor Priests* went about in large numbers, barefoot and wearing coarse brown robes. They were better known as Lollards, a mocking term meaning *mumblers* or *mutterers*. It was said that if someone saw two people walking down the road, one was sure to be a Lollard. The Lollard John Ashton, was scornfully described as *leaping up from his bed and, like a dog, ready to bark at the slightest sound*.

The Lollards suffered bitter persecution after the statute *De Heretico Comburendo* (1401) declared the death penalty for heretics. Those burned at the stake often had portions of the English Bible tied around their necks. Wycliffe himself was condemned on 260 counts at the Council of Constance (1414-18). Protected in life, in 1428 his remains were dug up and burned with his ashes thrown into a river.

Wycliffe was described after his death as *having lit a fire which shall never be put out*. It was said that he elevated the Bible as the believer's only source of truth, far more than all the other medieval theologians combined. Because of this, and with the honor he gave to preaching, marriage and manual work, he stands before the other reformers who would follow him.
